


Student and Class Registrations

- Winter: 140 unique students registered for 40 classes
- **Spring**: 152 unique students registered for 45classes
- Summer: 34 unique students registered for 7 classes
- Fall: 175 unique students registered for 37 classes
- **Total**, 340 unique students registered for classes during 2022




Class Enrollment

- 617 class enrollments by 340 unique students
- 473 enrollments in ESL classes to increase English language proficiency
- 88 enrollments in computer classes to gain technical skills and knowledge
- 56 enrollments in citizenship preparation classes to learn more about U.S. civics and to gain U.S citizenship
- 10 of the WTS students gained their U.S. citizenship




Classes

- 14 Citizenship preparation classes




Volunteer Teachers

- A total of 1,749 instructional hours




Student Learning Hours

- In total, students received 5,290 hours of instruction
- 4,432 student hours in ESL classes
- 500 student hours in computer classes
- 358 student hours in citizenship classes




Other Volunteer Hours

- Volunteers contributed time to committees (Strategic Planning; Technology; Curriculum; and Marketing/Development), administrative activities, and training




Student Residency and Regions of Origin

- 93% of our students reside in Eastern Pennsylvania (64% Bucks County, 18% Philadelphia County, and 11% Montgomery County)
- 7% reside in Burlington, Mercer and Hunterdon Counties in New Jersey




- During 2022, our students came from 53 different countries.
- 36% from Latin America (Mexico, Central and South America)
- 34% from Asia (exclusive of Russia)
- 25% from Europe (including all of Russia)
- 5% from Africa



Financial Support

- 157 individuals, 12 organizations, 6 foundations and 6 churches financially supported our work
- 62% of our budget comes from individuals
- 24 % comes from foundation grants and
- 14% comes from other organizations, including churches
