Volunteer Spotlight: The Doctor Will Teach You Now

After 46 years in internal medicine and radiology, Dr. William Ross was eager to find a worthwhile volunteer activity in his local community of Washington Crossing, PA. A friend who tutored with WTS suggested he try assisting with ESL classes, which he enjoyed. Then Bill found his true calling as a teacher: citizenship preparation.

In the six years that he has been teaching citizenship preparation for WTS, Bill has familiarized himself with all aspects of the process, from the initial green card application to the achievement of American citizenship (usually a 4-5 year undertaking).

During COVID-19, Bill discovered that he prefers to conduct classes virtually. "Teaching online gives me and my students greater flexibility with scheduling," he said. "You don't have to drive to participate."

Bill divides each class between teaching the civics and history information needed to pass the U.S. naturalization test and practicing conversations useful in everyday life in America.

One of Bill's students felt bad that she could not converse with other mothers at the school bus stop for her children. Bill encouraged her to talk to one of them and invite her for tea. Now, they get together regularly so the student can practice her English.

Two of his star students are a Russian couple named Irena and Sergi. Having no immediate family in Russia, Irena and Sergi decided to stay in America while visiting their daughter, son-in-law, and infant grandchild. "Our home is here now, close to our family," they say. "We want to be part of this country and vote, so we applied for our citizenship."

One aspect of Bill's classes that Sergi and Irena really enjoy is conversation. "We think in Russian, but we need to speak and answer the questions in English," they said.

Sergi and Irena attended their Naturalization Ceremony on August 10th. All members of their family were there for this proud day. So was Bill.

Said Bill, "We all have our ups and downs, and my students learn from different starting places. The one thing all my students have in common is that they are so grateful and don't take anything for granted in their new country."



What advice do Sergi and Irena have for other immigrants? "Set up deadlines and don't delay your studies. Do something every single day and have a plan. Find your weak spots and work on them extra. And ask other people to talk to you, so you can understand different accents. This is a frustrating journey, and we were old when we started it, but it is so good to be members of U.S. society and U.S. citizens! And to have Bill as a member of our family now!"
